Who Are We?

- The Norfolk Airport Authority is an independent political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia
- Governed by a *nine-member board of commissioners* appointed by Norfolk City Council
- The Authority *independently owns and operates* Norfolk International Airport and the land it sits on
- We are a *"city" within "cities"* we employ 225+ personnel functioning in the roles of administration, operations, parking, police, aircraft rescue and fire fighting, janitorial, building maintenance, and field maintenance



We Are a Business

- Just like any business:
 - We earn revenue
 - We incur costs
- Our operations are self-supporting
 - We receive **no** local taxes or subsidies
- Our major revenue sources (FY 2024):
 - Parking (38%)
 - Rent/Leases (23%)
 - Airline Landing Fees (15%)
 - Rental Car (14%)
 - Concession Commissions (9%)
 - Other (1%)

Transform ORF, now underway, is valued at nearly \$1 billion, all funded without local taxes.

RAC Request for Proposals – Key Items

Minimum Annual Guarantee

Each company's bid must not be lower than that company's combined brands' MAGs for FY2025.

> <u>Temporary Premises</u>: Determines number of R/R stalls assigned to Company

> <u>Permanent Premises</u> (ConRAC): Determines selection of floor for Company



Disclosure

Concession Agreement & Facility Lease

- <u>Concession Agreement</u>. This Agreement sets forth the obligations and privileges of Concessionaire with respect to the operation of the nonexclusive Concession at the Airport.
- Facility Lease. This Agreement sets forth the obligations and privileges of Concessionaire with respect to the use and occupancy of the Consolidated Facility at the Airport.

≻<u>Term</u>.

- > Concession Agreement. Ten (10) years from effective date (November 1, 2025).
- Facility Lease. Thirty (30) years from ConRAC operation commencement date (likely late 2027).



Temporary & Permanent Premises

- Temporary Premises (current facilities): counter, queue and office space in the Airport arrivals building and ready/return spaces and booth(s) in the parking garage (Garage A).
 - The temporary Premises will be designated as preferential space and assigned by the Authority.
 - The temporary Premises' counters, located in the terminal arrivals building, will be limited to one (1) brand per counter area.

Permanent Premises (ConRAC): counter and office space in the customer service building, ready/return spaces in the Consolidated Facility garage, and the Quick Turn Around area including associated facilities and lots.

> The permanent Premises may be designated as preferential or common space.



Payments

- Arrivals Terminal Building Rent. Temporary Premises at the arrivals terminal building on a per square foot basis at the signatory airlines' terminal rental rate for the applicable fiscal year.
- <u>Ready and Return Parking Facilities Rent</u>. Temporary Premises at the ready and return parking facilities on a per stall basis at the initial monthly rate of sixty dollars (\$60) per stall. A ready parking space is one stall and a return lane is equivalent to several stalls, depending on the length of the return lane.
- <u>Ground Rent</u>. Appraised Ground Rent commencing on the ConRAC Operation Commencement Date.
- Facility Rent Payments. Facility Rent commencing on the ConRAC Operation Commencement Date. For the Debt Service, Operating Expenses, Impositions, and related costs of the Consolidated Facility.
 - ➤ Facility Rent due for Debt Service will be paid by CFCs.
 - Facility Rent due for Operating Expenses will be determined on a per square foot basis, a per stall basis, a fixed fee basis, and/or a market share basis.
 - > Contingent Rent. Charged if there is a rent deficiency. Reimbursement from CFCs.
